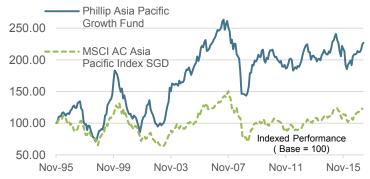

INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE & FOCUS

The investment objective of the Fund is to achieve medium to long term capital appreciation through investing the Deposited Property primarily in investments in or of companies with either assets wholly or partially in, or revenues wholly or partially derived from investment in countries and territories in the Asia Pacific region (including Japan, Australia and New Zealand) selected by the Managers for the purpose of investment of the Deposited Property. The total overall investment in equities or shares of companies in Emerging Markets is capped at 50% of the Value of the Deposited Property. The Fund is growth oriented and is authorised to invest in stocks and bonds, including but not limited to convertible bonds.

The Managers seek to identify emerging trends, underappreciated growth prospects and undervalued franchises. The Managers combine top-down and bottom-up approaches in managing the Fund; top-down approach tackles the asset and geographical allocation decisions while bottom-up approach tackles vigorous quantitative and qualitative analysis to determine the absolute and relative attractiveness of the securities. Subject to the provisions of the Code on Collective Investment Schemes issued by the MAS ("Code"), the Managers may also invest the Deposited Property into money market funds and collective investment schemes, including money market funds and collective investment schemes managed by the Managers during such time or times and on such terms as the Managers think fit in accordance with the investment objective and focus of the Fund. The management fees charged by the money market funds and collective investment schemes managed by the Managers will be rebated to the Fund, as may be agreed between the Managers and the Trustee. The Managers currently use financial derivative instruments ("FDIs") for the purpose of hedging and/or efficient portfolio management.

Asia-Pacific equity markets were again generally positive in April. For the month, the MSCI AC Asia Pacific Index rose 1.4% in Singapore dollar terms. Currency-adjusted, emerging ASEAN markets such as Malaysia, the Philippines, and Indonesia were among the strongest performers, while laggards included Australia (on the back of commodity weakness), Korea (due to geopolitical tension from North Korea) and the domestic China market (due to policy tightening). Among smaller markets, Sri Lanka was a standout performer in April, due to strong foreign and domestic institutional bargain-hunting.

The Fund rose 1.2% for April. It benefited from strong performance particularly in its Japan holdings, which mostly did better than the general market.

Within the month, we took profit on Asahi Group and Surya Semesta after strong performances. We also sold Cathay Financial and Keppel Corp, to deploy to stocks with better risk-reward. Samsung Electronics was one of the existing holdings that we added to as its temporary price weakness (due to the North Korean standoff) provided a buying opportunity. We also added JFE Holdings, one of the largest general steelmakers in Japan. It is poised to benefit from expanding steel margins (partly assisted by weakening iron ore input prices) and robust demand, after spending the last few years strengthening its balance sheet and upgrading its facilities. Steelmakers have derated after years of industry weakness and now present an attractive investment proposition.

The first hundred days of Donald Trump in office are coming to an end, and while there has been plenty of talk from the new President during this period, markets have come to recognise that many of the policies he vowed to implement during his election campaign may not materialise due to lack of support from lawmakers. There is still concern about his trade protectionist policies, which could punish cheap imports and labour entering the country, so it remains to be seen how America's trade policies, especially that with China, play out. On the positive side, economic numbers from various key economies continue to point to a sustained economic upturn, and this is providing the impetus for market strength right now. While there are events to watch out for such as the outcome of the French presidential elections, we think that valuations in most Asia-Pacific markets are not demanding and therefore in the event of a sustained economic upturn (as is happening now) there could be significant upside.

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
